



The Conservancy aspires to secure the financial future of the Square for future generations and contribute to the economic well being of the West Village, while upholding its core values of stewardship, community building, diversity and excellence. # Growing Solid Roots: Increased Care and Maintenance

#### **Planting & Gardening**

In 2014, as part of our efforts to make the Square more beautiful and welcoming in all seasons, the Conservancy embarked upon a multi-year project to increase the variety, density and health of the plantings. The following horticultural tasks were completed in 2014:

- East and West beds were redesigned in the spring (North bed delayed until 2015 due to budget constraints); mature evergreens and flowering shrubs were planted, including boxwoods, yews, pieris and azaleas;
- Hundreds of flowering summer annuals were installed in the center island, and new shrubs and perennials planted in the perimeter beds;
- Much-needed pruning was done of all understory and London Plane trees;
- Compost, soil and fertilizer were added to all beds spring and fall;
- Ongoing tending to plants was performed: weeding, deadheading, pruning and replacement;
- Over 9,600 spring bulbs were planted in October, including tulips, windflowers, crocus, chionodoxa, galanthus and allium; and
- Eight yards of mulch was distributed to tuck in the bulbs for the winter.

#### **Groundskeeping & Maintenance**

We are also focused on cleanliness and improved overall maintenance of the Square. The Conservancy employs a part-time groundskeeper. In addition to the City's trash collection, the groundskeeper and his crew haul out garbage and sweep in the Square 1-2 times daily during "high season" from April 1 to November 30, and provide other maintenance as needed, including:

- Sweeping paths and clearing trash from the gardens;
- Hosing down the bluestone paths weekly;
- Emptying NYC trash baskets outside the Square;
- Ongoing repair and maintenance of the irrigation system;
- Repainting the post and chains around the garden beds and lawn; and
- Clearing fall leaves from the paths and gardens.



# Planting the Seeds for a Successful Future

In 2014, the Conservancy took a number of important steps in the effort to develop the Square into a shared and permanent neighborhood trust.

The Conservancy:

#### **Established a Reserve Fund**

In 2014, the Conservancy established a reserve fund, which is critically important for the success, and perhaps even the survival, of the Conservancy. The monies in the reserve fund, which are currently \$15,000, have been set aside for 1) use in the event of a financial emergency such as an unforeseen interruption of cash flow or 2) for specific projects and improvements in the future. When thinking about the value of the reserve fund, it is useful to consider various undesirable or unpredictable situations. What if a significant contributor ceases support? What if the Square suddenly requires a major infrastructure investment such as a new irrigation system? In each of these scenarios, the immediate impact is mitigated by having a "rainy day" fund. The fundraising goal for 2015 includes adding an additional \$40,000 to the Conservancy's reserve fund.

#### **Became a Stand-alone Nonprofit**

In June 2014, the Conservancy obtained recognition from the IRS as a 501(c)(3) charity. Nonprofit status is essential to robust fundraising and eventually, a permanent endowment. (Previously, the Conservancy had been fiscally-sponsored by Open Space Institute.) In October 2014, The Conservancy began operations as a stand-alone entity.

#### Formed the Advisory Board

To help continue the Conservancy's development and assure its longevity, in February 2014, under the leadership of Virginia Davies and Willard Taylor, the Conservancy established the Advisory Board. Comprised of individuals who have made a significant commitment to meeting the Conservancy's mission of restoring, managing and enhancing the park, the Advisory Board's goals include developing a robust annual fund, establishing a permanent endowment and engaging in community relations.

In a small nonprofit organization like the Conservancy that has one part-time, paid staff member, members of the Conservancy's governing board take on almost all governance, management and day-to-day operational tasks. This hands-on governance model deters many individuals who wish to support the Square in a less time-intensive way from serving on the Conservancy's governing board. A separate Advisory Board was created to integrate these critical neighbors and other friends of the Square into the work of the Conservancy and expedite its essential fundraising mission.

# Planting the Seeds for a Successful Future

#### Strengthened Its Residential Building Donor Program with The Abingdon

In July 2014, the board of The Abingdon, the condominium that was formerly the West Village Nursing Home and overlooks the Square, voted to join the Conservancy's Residential Building Donor Program.

#### **Elected a New Chair**


In September 2014, the organization successfully executed a leadership transition. Rotating the role of the chair will help to ensure that the organization will have greater durability and vitality. The Conservancy seeks to engage committed citizens who will be ready to step into its leadership roles and maintain an organization that is "built to last."

#### **Hired a Pro Bono General Counsel**


In March 2014, the Conservancy retained Collin Glidewell as its General Counsel on a pro bono basis. Collin is the first general counsel in the history of the Conservancy. A general counsel is part of the essential infrastructure necessary to support a stand-alone nonprofit organization. The key responsibilities of the role include knowledge of nonprofit corporate law and governance, compliance with tax exemption, contracts, fundraising law, municipal law and government relations. Collin was instrumental in successfully shepherding the adjudication of the Conservancy's status as a nonprofit public charity to a successful conclusion.


#### **Hired a Part-Time Administrator**

In October 2014, the Conservancy hired a part-time, paid administrator to organize and manage the business functions of the Conservancy, duties which were formerly handled by our fiscal sponsor. The position requires 5 to 10 hours per month, except in March and April when the planning, preparation and execution of the Conservancy's annual community fundraiser takes place. The administrator's responsibilities include bookkeeping and financial reporting; administrative tasks such as maintenance of the Conservancy's CRM database, donor correspondence, planning and execution of events and follow-up, and the coordination of direct mail campaigns. Our administrator Sue Russon has helped enormously to professionalize the organization.





# **A Rich History**

# 1744

Sir Peter Warren, a vice-admiral in the British Navy, purchases a 300-acre farm known as Greenwich, extending along the Hudson River from what is now Christopher Street north to around West 21st Street and east to around what is now Broadway. His eldest daughter Charlotte marries Willoughby Bertie, the Fourth Earl of Abingdon, and a share of the Warren estate, which includes the land that will come to be known as Abingdon Square, is part of her dowry.

# 1794

The City Council changes the designation of streets and places with British names in order to reflect American independence. Nonetheless, the name Abingdon Square is preserved, because the Earl of Abingdon and his wife had sympathized with the American patriots and he had argued in Parliament against British policy in the colonies.

# 1831

The Common Council resolves that the ground called Abingdon Square should be enclosed as a public park and appropriates \$3,000 for the expense.


